Rector's Corner

In the book entitled *The Five Love Languages*, the author, Gary Chapman, highlights that you can tell what someone else's love language is based on how they express love to you. For example, some people are gift givers, while others don't care as much about gifts but their love language is expressed through words of affirmation. The art in relationship is to discover what the other person's love language is, so that you can express your love to them in the most effective way - especially if their love language is different than yours. This reminds me of the story of a couple who, after 25 years of marriage, had an argument one day when one of them snaps at the other for placing before her yet another peanut butter and jelly sandwich made using the *ends* of the loaf of the bread. "I can't take this anymore!" She says to him with indignation, "I love peanut butter and Jelly sandwiches, but why do you always give me the ends of the loaf and not the normal slices (you know the full ones right in the middle)!" convinced that he's been selfish all these years. To her astonishment, however, the husband stares at her with a noticeable sadness in his eyes and says, "I'm so sorry...the ends are my favorite part!" The art of love, whether it's romantic love, or love between friends or family members, or siblings, is to learn the love language of the other; and often, one of the easiest ways to learn what that may be is to notice the way they express love to you.

**Outreach Sunday for
Transitional Housing Corporation (THC)

There has been a 50% increase in family homelessness in Washington, D.C. since 2010. THC is trying to prevent families from becoming homeless by providing and creating more affordable housing in DC. For families that are homeless THC provides transitional, permanent supportive housing, and rapid rehousing options based on their need. St. John's Beechwood Road property has sold

Some who are newer to the parish may not have known that we own a rectory, so here is a bit of background: In 1952 the purchase of the Beechwood property was made possible by the Women of St. John's, through the provision of funds raised by the Opportunity Shop. For many decades it provided housing for the Rector of St. John's.

However, since 1993, it has been used only sparingly as the Rector's residence. As a rental property it has provided substantial income to the church and served as collateral for the chancel/organ loan. In 2013, a team was asked to review the ownership of the property.

In 2014 the decision was made to sell the property and use the proceeds to endow a fund that will support options for Rector housing. (To learn more about this project please visit St. John's website and click on "Members").

The property went on the market early this Summer with the asking price of \$1,195,000. After receiving offers from two buyers, we accepted an offer for \$1,235,000, minus approximately \$5600 for needed repairs.

St. John's net from the sale will exceed our initial goal. We will close on the property September 30.

Because of the dedicated work of several parishioners, this process has moved to completion in a remarkably efficient manner. It has, however, required a great deal of work behind the scenes for which we owe thanks to Scott Cotter, Bill Fry, Brad Kennedy, and Earle O'Donnell.

The Altar Guild is looking for “Friends”

On September 28, we will have an open house at 10 am in the Sacristy (the little room next to the stairs to the Parish Hall) where preparations are made for worship services. We’d love to show you our organized cupboards or how to iron linens so the embroidered crosses stand out. Please consider serving on the Altar Guild and how you can “drop in” as a Friend of the Altar Guild—you might like it enough to become a full-fledged member of this joyful ministry.

Every worship service at St John’s begins and ends with the Altar Guild. Our 18-member team sets up for and cleans up after every service. And we’re looking for some help! We’re not necessarily asking for new members, we’re looking for “Friends!”

If you have attended the 5:00 service, you may be aware that a group of regular attendees sets up the Altar and chancel for that service. They are the original group of Altar Guild Friends. The after-11:15 Altar Guild group prepares everything for the 5:00 service in the sacristy and the 5:00 Friends take the items out and put them on the Altar. They also take everything back to the sacristy after the service.

We would like to extend the Friends concept to all of the other services. We’re looking for volunteers to lend a hand clearing the table, refilling candles, and generally helping in the sacristy from time to time. We need help immediately after each service. There will always be a regular Altar Guild member present to instruct and direct volunteers, and usually tasks are as simple as washing dishes.

Both the Alleluia and St. John’s choirs pray this prayer at the beginning of each rehearsal. Whether we are working on an anthem or hymn, the words that we “sing with our lips” act as our guide – shaping and directing how we phrase each line in the music.

The choirs often hear me say, “Sing it like you mean it!” My words (spoken only in kindness) are a gentle reminder that we need to “believe in our hearts” before the words of our songs will be heard as true thanks and praise to God.
